Daily Procedures

Morning:

- Parents are expected to drop children off between 8:30 am - 8:44am
- Gates and classroom doors are opened at 8:30am and areas are supervised
- Parents using car drop off are not to get out of the car. This is a continual area of traffic flow
- Bus travellers are dropped off in the bus zones from 8:20 am - 8:40am
Bus travellers will only be supervised from this time.
- Learners go to their classroom, unpack and prepare for learning
- Learning begins with prayer @ 8:45am

Afternoon:

- Children are dismissed from classrooms at 3:05pm. Parents are welcome to wait outside classrooms or at an agreed pick up spot in the yard
- Gates open to the community at 3:00pm
- Parents can collect children from four exit locations around the school; the Foundation yard, the Bridlington Ave gate, the Wilkinson Drv gate or the car pick up which processes through from the office and staff car park entry
- Parents using car pick up are not to get out of the car. This is a continual area of traffic flow
- Bus travellers are collected in the bus zones from 3:15pm - 3:30pm

Late Arrivals and Early Dismissals:

- Children arriving late must enter and sign in via the office
- Children leaving early must sign out and exit via the office

Supporting successful day to day school life

- **Teachers are unavailable before school** to have meetings and important conversations as they are setting up the learning environment for the day. If you need to provide the teacher with information, please send an email or leave a message with the office.
- **We encourage parents to make appointments** with St Mary's staff at mutually agreeable times if longer discussions are needed. All meetings are held in the Hayden Centre in Meeting Rooms.
- **Ensure your child has all they need for a successful day of learning**; healthy food, a filled water bottle, correct uniform and clarity on pickup and drop off arrangements. All school items need to be labeled with your child(rens) names so they can be returned to the rightful owners.

- **Communicate any questions or concerns with your child's classroom teacher first** they are the most informed. Your child's teacher is most informed of day to day incidents and is in tune with your child's interactions and wellbeing at school. Refrain from speaking to other parents about their child. Follow the St Mary's Communication process if concerns and questions remain unresolved.

Trust the school to always put the needs of all children at the forefront of our decisions, goals and interactions. St Mary's has a highly qualified and passionate educational team who strive to make a difference to every child.

Parent Code of Conduct

St. Mary's School greatly values the partnership and connection it maintains with its parent community. We recognise that through collaboration, we can significantly enhance the support we offer to your child. As a child-safe organisation, we consistently prioritise the care and safety of our learners.

At the time of enrolment, parents are required to sign a parent code of conduct, affirming their commitment to fostering the safe and nurturing environment we diligently strive to create.

We encourage parents to follow the appropriate channels when addressing any concerns, assuring that St. Mary's will always act in the best interest of the child. Please note that any violation of the parent code of conduct may lead to disciplinary measures.

School Fees and Financials

St Mary's sets an annual schedule of school fees which is made available to families in Term 4 each year to enable financial planning for families. Schools in Catholic Education are advised to increase fees annually in accordance with the Educational Consumer Price Index. Our school fees and levies ensure St Mary's cover daily running costs as well as educational resources for our learners. Families commit and agree at enrolment to pay and contribute to school fees to the fullest capacity possible.

Catholic schools operate on approximately 80% of the funding of what the state schools receive from the Government. Through school fees parents help to reduce the gap from 20% to around 10%. Even though it may not seem like much individually, when all families contribute to the financial needs of the school via fees it makes a huge difference to the opportunities children at St Mary's can receive.

It is the school's belief that no child will be denied an opportunity to attend St Mary's due to financial hardship. The Principal of the school is available to meet parents to discuss any hardships around paying school fees. There is an opportunity to apply for financial assistance from the school to help alleviate any issues around school fees if the need occurs.

Each year families will complete the "Direct Debit Authority" form to schedule payments which will be set up by the school to pay either by Debit or Credit card, or Direct Deposit. Direct debits will be processed on a Friday and can be set up for weekly, fortnightly, monthly or the 19th, quarterly or annual installments.

Any other payment arrangement is to be discussed with the School Principal and is subject to approval.

Centrepay is also available for Centrelink recipients and payments can be deducted from their benefits.

Families who own a valid Health Care Card are eligible for a significant reduction in school fees. Please contact our school office to action this relief.

St Mary's adheres to its Fee Policy and Procedures which is founded on the Catholic Education Sandhurst School Fee policy. Our fee policy is available on our website and on Compass.

Fees / Levy Descriptions

Family School Fee	The Family School fee is a one off family fee that contributes to the daily operational costs of the school.
Learning Levy	The Learning Levy covers costs for classroom and stationary supplies, a contribution to ICT Leases and maintenance as well as Specialists Curriculum resources and activities.
Learning Experience Levy	The Learning Experience Levy covers all extracurricular learning experiences such as; excursions, incursions and sporting commitments.
ICT Levy	The ICT Levy contributes to the leasing of devices, subscriptions and multimedia resources and facilities that are used to engage and enhance learning and teaching throughout the school.
Capital / Maintenance Levy	The Capital/Maintenance Levy covers regular school yard and building maintenance and improvement. It covers the care of the grounds and basic upkeep of buildings and facilities.

Direct Debit is our preferred method of payment. You can choose to pay weekly /fortnightly / monthly / quarterly /annually. Direct Debit Forms are available to print via Compass or collect from the office.

The Sacramental Program

Learners are introduced to the Sacraments of Reconciliation, First Eucharist and Confirmation in Year 2 through the curriculum. In Years 3 and 4 learners are invited to celebrate their First Reconciliation, First Eucharist and Confirmation.

The Sacramental program, preparation and celebration is a Parish based approach. St Mary's Parish Sacramental Team members consist of parishioners, teachers and parents. St. Mary's Parish and St. Aloysius' Parish Moama, work together to support children in preparation to receive the sacraments of Reconciliation, Confirmation and Eucharist. This collaborative approach hopes to support families as they journey with their children in the next stage of their faith development. The Sacramental program is conducted in small groups run by parents outside of school hours.

Assessment and Reporting

St Mary's uses ongoing formative and summative assessment to target, progress and analyse a learner's point of need. Educators assess daily in a variety of ways as well as adhering to St Mary's Assessment and Reporting schedule. St Mary's uses multiple assessment platforms, tests and tools to ensure the teaching and learning program is growing every individual and accurately plans and prepares where to next.

Parents are encouraged to discuss your child's individual learning journey at any time. Throughout the school year, parents are regularly informed around your child's progress at school.

- **Learning Conversations:**

Twice yearly parents attend a collaborative conversation to discuss growth, goals and progress.

- **Formal Reports:**

Twice yearly teachers provide parents with a written report aligned with the Victorian Curriculum and Religious Education.

- **Termly Assessment:**

Depending on the year level, your child(ren) will undergo formative assessment, that targets and drives explicit teaching.

St Mary's has a team of educators who liaise with Leaders of Pedagogy to target learners with specific learning needs, both intervention and acceleration. St Mary's recognises that all learners learn and progress differently and we aim to know our learners intimately to best support their journey.

GENERAL SCHOOL OPERATIONS

Attendance and Absence

It is the parents / carers responsibility to ensure their child attends school everyday. It is compulsory in Australia for children between 6-17 years of age to attend school every day that the school is open unless there is a reasonable excuse for absence. Reasonable excuses for absence are; illness, appointments, bereavement. Family holidays are also often a time when a child is absent. **If your family is taking a holiday of 5 days or more, a letter to the principal must be provided.**

If your child is going to be absent from school, families need to log the absence on Compass, providing a reason for the absence. If St Mary's does not receive notification of absence by 9:15am, a text message or phone call is made to families following up on the absence prior to 10:30am daily. All absence from school must be accounted for and reported.

St Mary's staff and leadership monitor learner's attendance regularly. If data indicates ongoing and concerning absence, families will be notified by the school. Regular school attendance is vital for all children and young people to succeed in education and missing school days can have a big impact on a child's future. We are committed to working with the school community, parents, guardians and/or carers to encourage and support full school attendance. Parents, guardians and or carers experiencing attendance issues with a child, must notify the classroom teacher so that we can work together to get your child to school every day.

Birthdays

Birthdays are extremely special at St Mary's and we love to be able to celebrate and recognise when a learner is celebrating a birthday! On your child's birthday they are welcome to wear casual clothes. If your child's birthday falls over a weekend or holiday period, they are welcome to wear casual clothes on their return to school.

Camps and Excursions

Camps and excursions are an important part of the school curriculum, in which all children are expected to participate. The School Camping Program provides for an ongoing development in independence and responsibility as each child moves through the primary school. The programs are for children in Years 3-6.

Every school camp is planned, prepared and organised to cater for all learners needs and to ensure inclusivity. Even if programs have to be modified we strive to have every child attend camp. At times we rely on parent volunteers. Parents who volunteer to attend camps and excursions must complete St Mary's Child Safe Volunteer Induction program and have a current Working with Children's Check. A WWCC is free when working as a volunteer for the school. Please see the Deputy Principal to register your interest.

Catholic Identity

At St Mary's, we are invested in the education of the whole person - spiritually, physically, academically, emotionally and socially. We are inclusive of all in our community who respect and support the Catholic mission of the school. Our mission is to continue the works and teachings of Jesus within our world. Our Catholic Identity is who we are, what we aspire to be and how we celebrate. Jesus is a central figure in our school and we use the Catholic faith and traditions to grow in faith and love, while embracing those of other faiths through interfaith dialogue and respect.

Catholic Identity at St Mary's is nurtured daily in prayer, school culture and our every interaction with one another. Our day begins with prayer, gratitude and mindfulness. Within the school routine we can celebrate our faith story in masses, liturgies and religious education.



GENERAL SCHOOL OPERATIONS

Our Catholic Identity is inclusive of all and an opportunity for all faith denominations to learn and respect one another's beliefs and points of view. Our school explores our catholic history, traditions and rituals and provides opportunities for learners to spiritually grow and richly connect with their faith in the world they live in.

Our learners receive explicit Religious education daily. It aims to be rich, real and relevant and integrated into all we do. Our Catholic Identity Leader supports our learners and teachers in providing a curriculum that engages and excites. St Mary's graduate outcomes are deeply embedded in our Religious Education curriculum and provide opportunities for learners to deeply transfer their learnings into the people they are and the lives they wish to live.

Child Safe Guarding Standards

St Mary's is a child safe school. We are committed to the wellbeing and safety of every child. All learners enrolled at St Mary's, and any child visiting, have a right to feel safe and be safe all of the time. The wellbeing of children in our care will always be our first priority and we have zero tolerance to child abuse. We aim to create a child safe and child friendly environment where children feel safe and are free to enjoy life to the fullest without any concern for their safety.

We are committed to providing a safe and nurturing culture for all children and young people at St Mary's through:

- All learners deserve, as a fundamental right, safety and protection from all forms of abuse and neglect.
- Our schools work in partnership with families and the community to ensure that they are engaged in decision-making processes, particularly those that have an impact on child safety, wellbeing and protection.
- All learners have the right to a thorough and systematic education in all aspects of personal safety, in partnership with their parents/guardians/carers.

- All adults in our schools, including teaching and non-teaching staff, clergy, volunteers and contractors, have a responsibility to care for children and young people, to positively promote their wellbeing, to identify and mitigate risks related to child safety and wellbeing in the school environment and to protect them from any kind of harm or abuse.
- The policies, guidelines and codes of conduct for the care, wellbeing and protection of learners are based on honest, respectful and trusting relationships between adults, children and young people.
- Policies and practices demonstrate compliance with legislative requirements and cooperation with the Church, governments, the police and human services agencies.
- All persons involved in situations where harm is suspected or disclosed must be treated with sensitivity, dignity and respect.
- All members of the school community (including learners and their families) are kept informed of child safety and wellbeing matters (where appropriate) and are involved in promoting child safety and wellbeing.
- School employees, volunteers, contractors, clergy, parents and learners are able to raise concerns about child safety and wellbeing, knowing these will be taken seriously by school leadership.
- Appropriate confidentiality will be maintained, with information being provided to those who have a right or a need to be informed, either legally (including under legislated information sharing schemes being Child Information Sharing Scheme (CISS) or Family Violence Information Sharing Scheme (FVISS)) or pastorally.

COMMUNITY WELLNESS

Our commitment is to create a school environment where children and young people are respected, their voices are heard and where they feel safe and are safe.

Staff, Parents and Carers are required to read our Child Safe Policies and Procedures, available on our school website www.smechuca.catholic.edu.au as part of your acceptance of enrolment. These policies and procedures must be adhered to.

Community Wellness

St Mary's recognises that our school wellness must be nurtured daily. The wellness of all in our community is a priority and we strive to ensure that our relationships and partnerships are authentic, built of mutual respect and trust. We know that if we prioritise our community wellness, all will thrive, grow and achieve.

St Mary's has a robust Community Wellness team; the Deputy Principal: Community Wellness, Leader of Learning Diversity and Inclusion, Catholic Identity Leader, Psychologist and a Youth Social Worker. This team meets regularly to discuss the community wellness of all in our school. The team is led by the Deputy Principal: Community Wellness and is supported by Catholic Education Sandhurst to ensure we are consistently and proactively nurturing a well community.

At times throughout our school journey, staff, learners and parents may require the additional support of our networks and allied health experts. These supports may be an interim adjustment or an intervention that is required for the entire school journey. All supports, interventions and adjustments are personalised for each individual.

Allied Health Support and Services

- St Mary's works in collaboration with allied health services and experts to integrate reasonable adjustments into a learners program at school. Allied health staff are welcome to come into the school to support a learner's needs.
- Allied health experts are engaged by the school or family to support specific needs of a child. These health professionals range from speech and occupational therapists, to educational psychologists. St Mary's willingly works with families who obtain NDIS plans.
- St Mary's employs its own Psychologist, Occupational Therapist, Speech Pathologist and Social Worker.
- A referral process must be completed for learners to access these supports.

Restorative Practices, Restorative Teaching

- St Mary's is committed to Restorative Practices, Restorative Teaching. Restorative Practices can provide an explicit practice capable of building healthier relationships and stronger school communities. Working restoratively is not something that we do, nor is it a program we implement – it's something that we become, and it underpins the way that we practice. Restorative approaches will help us manage conflict and tensions by focusing on repairing harm and strengthening relationships. When we work restoratively, we focus on teaching responsibility for actions.

Community Youth and Wellness Leader

- Our Community Youth and Family Wellness Leader supports all members of our community. This role supports youth work and outreach within our community. The Community Youth and Wellness Leader facilitates social and emotional groups, connect regularly with families and works with staff in pastoral support. Our learners are encouraged to get to know our Community Youth and Wellness Leader and seek support or a friendly visit at any time.

Social Worker

- St Mary's employs a social worker in a part time capacity. Leaders and teachers often identify a need in a learner or group of learners where the skills and knowledge of a social worker can support and nurture successful relationships at school and home. Our school Social Worker provides recommendations for both the home and school to support the learners wellbeing. A referral process must be completed for learners to access these support.
- All requests for support are triaged and prioritised by the Community Wellness Team.

Nurse

- St Mary's employs a qualified Nurse to support the needs of the First Aid Room. The Nurse can administer certain medication with written permission from parents and supporting documentation from medical professionals and offer practical medical advice for overall school community health. They may at times provide health education to learners and families.

Communication

St Mary's recognises that effective communication is crucial to successful partnerships with our families. We are committed to having constant and regular communication and an openness to share both our successes and challenges. We encourage our families to also stay in constant communication with their child's teachers sharing what is going well and what might be improved.

In all first instances families are to go to their child's classroom teacher.

Your child's classroom teacher interacts with your child daily, observes their social and emotional wellbeing and will be informed of any concerns or incidents that may have occurred during the school day. St Mary's has a multitude of communication platforms which serve to keep our community well informed.

Behaviour Curriculum

St. Mary's is dedicated to implementing a comprehensive behaviour curriculum. Effective behavior management among our learners requires explicit instruction, ongoing monitoring, and assessment. Our staff is committed to maintaining a safe, calm, and orderly learning environments where educational success is the primary focus. In instances of challenging behaviour, we will employ redirection and resetting strategies. Should such behaviour persist, we may prompt a reset in an alternative setting, such as a neighbouring classroom or a breakout area or timed session.

Our approach to re-engaging learners is rooted in restorative practices, emphasising the potential impact of their actions and fostering personal reflection and growth. In situations involving serious or unsafe behavioural breaches, appropriate

consequences will be implemented, which may include withdrawal from events, breaks, or specific activities. Parents will be promptly informed of these incidents and invited to collaborate with the school to facilitate improvement.

St. Mary's embraces a whole-school approach that teaches, reinforces, and expects all learners to adhere to the following core values:

- Be Respectful
- Be a Learner
- Be Inclusive
- Be Safe

In alignment with our graduate outcomes, St. Mary's will explicitly teach behaviours that support these expectations.

Family Information Update

Have you recently...

- Moved house?
- Changed your email address?
- Bought a new mobile phone or changed mobile number?
- Changed jobs and work phone number?
- Changed your child's emergency contacts?
- Had a change of family circumstances?
- Had updates to your Visa status?

If your details have changed recently, you will need to update your details on Compass or advise the school as soon as possible. This ensures that information about your child is current and correct.

First Aid, Illness and Medication

St Mary's employs a qualified Nurse to support the needs of the First Aid Room. The Nurse can administer certain medication with the permission from parents and offer practical medical advice for overall school community health. They may at times provide health education to learners in the classroom. St Mary's has an extremely well resourced first aid room throughout the school day. In addition to our school nurse all staff regularly complete courses in First Aid with specific Asthma, Anaphylaxis and CPR training.

If a child is hurt or unwell they are sent with a pass to the first aid room to be triaged and supported. All visits to the first aid room are documented on a child's profile and families informed. When illness or accident occurs, parents are notified and when necessary, are asked to take their child home or to a doctor. St Mary's will contact parents in the event that a child has had a knock, bump or any physical impact to the head.

If your child has a specific medical plan, this must be provided at enrolment and updated annually. St Mary's will only distribute prescription medication with a current medical plan formalised by a qualified health professional.

St Mary's school nurse will contact families when renewal of plans and medication is needed. These plans include allergies, asthma, dietary requirements and any regular medication plans.

St Mary's Foundation learners see a School Nurse from Health and Community Services visits once a year to check Foundation children for sight, hearing and general medical problems. Parent consent is required and all families receive a report and any recommendations post the visit.

While at school your child may experience a range of illness and infections. St Mary's utilises the Royal Children's Hospital website for fact sheets, recommended treatment and time needed away from school. The Department of Education and Training also provides current guidelines around illness, infection and school expectations.

Food at School

St Mary's recommends healthy and balanced food for the school day. A variety of fresh food is encouraged for all children in a well cooled and kept lunch box. St Mary's is environmentally conscious and asks that families support as much nude food as possible. It not only promotes environmental awareness, it also keeps our school yard neat and tidy, clear from litter. If a child forgets their lunch, St Mary's has basic provisions to accommodate this. If families are dropping food in during the school day, we recommend that healthy options are only provided.

Every child is to have a clearly labelled, fresh and filled water bottle daily to use when needed. St Mary's has many bubble taps however personal water bottles are encouraged during learning times.

Canteen - Fit Foodie

On a Monday, Wednesday and Friday St Mary's locally outsources an option of canteen. Orders are placed online after setting up a Quick Cliq family account. St Mary's collaborates with our canteen provider to ensure we are striving to have healthy options available on our termly menus. Termly menus and ordering information is available via Compass and the newsletter.

Breakfast Club

St Mary's offers Brekky Club daily from our school kitchen. This option is available to every learner who might like something extra or need refueling prior to learning for the day. Our Brekky Club is donated from local businesses and our families. Our Year 6 Leaders support our Brekky Club daily and help staff to greet, serve and set up.

House Groups

St Mary's prides itself on our inclusive and encouraging House groups and sporting Program which is celebrated regularly throughout the school year.

Our explicit sporting program involves participation in:-

- Annual Athletics Carnival (F-6)
- Annual Swimming Carnival (Years 3-6)
- Swimming Program: Years 3-6 beginning and end of year, Foundation-Year 2 end of year.
- Interschool Sport: Years 6 Term Two and Three (Football, Netball, Softball, European Handball)
- Cross Country (Years 3-6)

Our school provides the opportunity for children to extend their sporting talents by participating in regional and state competitions and championships.

St Mary's has an inter school sports policy and procedure to ensure clarity, fair and reasonable participation.

On enrolment your child will be allocated to a House group which they will belong to for their entire journey at St Mary's. The house groups gather for sport, cross peer learning and school celebrations. Year 6 Leaders support our house groups and model leadership during these occasions.





Learning and Teaching

Digital Technologies - Digital Citizens

St Mary's recognises that our learners are learning and growing in a digital world. St Mary's strives to ensure we have the latest technology available to staff and learners and are exploring a variety of tools, platforms and resources to ensure we are nurturing their digital literacy. Part of the digital technologies program is to consistently educate our staff and learners on safe and appropriate use of all technologies and online resources.

St Mary's uses a variety of devices and technologies throughout the school.

St Mary's uses iPads and MacBooks, along with Chromebooks exploring a variety of Apps to think, learn and create. Every learning community is resourced with devices and interactive technologies that are available to all learners: interactive whiteboards, a bank of laptops and iPads, and wifi access. As part of our schedule of fees every child in the school contributes to the leasing and subscriptions of devices and online resources. Devices come home with Learners in Year 5 and 6 for home learning and charging daily.



LEARNING AND TEACHING

St Mary's - eSmart

St Mary's is a proud eSmart School gaining accreditation in 2019. The eSmart program is designed to educate, track, monitor and prevent bullying and cyberbullying. It supports the school to embrace the benefits of technology while reducing children's exposure to cyber risks, such as cyber bullying, online sexual predation, sexting, identity theft and fraud. St Mary's has implemented various measures across the school to reduce these risks such as individual user agreements, eSmart policy, technology misuse tracking and parent community engagement workshops.

We constantly revise our policies and user agreements to ensure parents, learners and teachers are all involved and take responsibility for the way they engage with technologies.

Minnie Laing Centre: St Mary's Library

St Mary's School has a Library/Resource Centre which is fully automated. Each class has a timetabled library lesson during the week. In addition, children, parents and teachers are welcome to utilise the Library before school.

Learning Communities

At St Mary's we operate as one united learning community, however, within our community we have sub communities where we live and learn. Every community has a learning and teaching team that includes classroom teachers and Education Support Officers (ESO).

Within each learning community, each child is aligned to a specific homeroom teacher however is still considered part of the whole learning community. Teachers work as a professional and collaborative learning team, working together to plan programs, analyse data, and target the explicit learning journey of each child. These highly effective teams also collaborate and support each other in their teaching – all of which will consequently benefit each and every child in the school

Intervention and Extension

St Mary's recognises that every learner learns, grows and develops differently. Through our targeted and evidence based approach we are able to provide learning at a learner's zone of proximal development. At times throughout one's schooling, we may be challenged or need to be further challenged with our learning. St Mary's educators work with our Leaders of Pedagogy in key curricular areas to plan and provide small group sessions of extension or intervention learning. These small groups explicitly focus on target areas for short periods of time before re-engaging in the classroom. Testing and assessment within these groups are used to track progression and learning behaviours to best support the learner and future teaching approaches.

Learners with Additional Needs

St Mary's is an organisation that is inclusive of all needs. It strives to provide personalised and adjusted learning to accommodate learners with learning needs and diagnosis. At St Mary's we have developed a whole school response plan to support and include learners with additional needs. St Mary's Leader of Learning Diversity and Inclusion in consultation with teams of teachers work to monitor and analyse data to ensure progression. At times our professional educators may collaborate and discuss gaps in progression and complete our pre-referral process to ensure we are deeply analysing a learner's needs.

LEARNING AND TEACHING

St Mary's will consult parents, external agencies and allied health to provide additional expertise and recommendations if a learner's learning requires support.

For children with specific learning or physical disabilities, a Personalised Learning Program (PLP) is developed in conjunction with the Leader of Learning Diversity. A Program Support Group (PSG) is formed to collaborate, set goals and review adjustments.

The PSG is made up of Parents, their Advocate, the Class Teacher, Learner Support Person and Learning Diversity Leader. At times the Allied Health professionals attend. The Principal can also be involved. The PSG meets at least once per term. Parents with a child in PLP are expected to attend these meetings.



GENERAL SCHOOL OPERATIONS

Lost Property

St Mary's expects that all families will clearly label all school items with your child's name and surname. It allows our learners to quickly identify and take responsibility for their own belongings. Our school hats, bags and reading satchels are often embroidered with your child's name. This service is available at Hip Pocket Echuca.

St Mary's lost property can be found in the administration area of the school. Our learners regularly check this and parents are welcome to come and find missing items also. Our administration staff clean our lost property tubs regularly and return to the rightful owners.

Medical Information

Every family is required to provide private information relevant to your child's medical needs and history. It is a legal requirement that all children who attend primary school are immunized and provide proof of vaccination on enrolment.

St Mary's learner medical information is kept on each individual's profile with any specific needs or medications highlighted. Parents are expected to provide current medications, action plans and update your child's individual medical profile annually. St Mary's can only administer medication with parent consent and a completed medication distribution form. All medical information of your child will remain private and confidential. This information will be logged on our Parent Management system, learner profile - Compass.

Parent Involvement and Volunteers

St Mary's will often ask for helpers both in and outside the classroom. It is so important to our school to have our parents in and around our learning experiences. If you are interested in volunteering throughout your child(ren)s schooling be sure to complete our Volunteer process and check under Child Safe Guarding on our website.

Please speak to your child's teacher or come and visit the office to find out the many ways you can help. All volunteers at St Mary's must hold a current Working With Children's Check and complete an induction with the Leadership team, inclusive of signing and agreeing to a Parent Code of Conduct.

Policies and Procedures

St Mary's practices and procedures are underpinned by the school system policies. Our policies provide clear expectations that help create a safe, consistent and supportive learning environment for all stakeholders. They guide decision-making, ensure fairness and help St Mary's meet legal and operational requirements. Policies also strengthen teaching and learning by outlining shared practices and responsibilities. Within a Catholic school, policies play an important role in upholding the school's Catholic Identity - promoting Gospel values, nurturing respectful relationships, and ensuring that all actions and procedures reflect the dignity, well-being and faith development of every learner. On enrolment, our families commit to adhering to our school and system-wide policies. We encourage parents to explore these on our website.

Transition to School

Starting and finishing primary school are significant milestones in a child's life. St Mary's strives to have positive and productive relationships with our Preschools and Secondary Schools in hope of bridging the gap between educational settings and ensuring all learners are set up for success. As a united community it is vital that our learners have a sense of belonging and happiness in all educational settings that they attend.

GENERAL SCHOOL OPERATIONS

Foundation Learners Start to School Life

St Mary's welcomes our learners and families officially when the Stage 2 enrolment application is fully complete. This happens in May of each year. From May our families are kept in constant communication to ensure that you feel well inducted and informed around St Mary's school life. In term 4 our Foundation learners attend five sessions of school transition where they become familiar with the school grounds, facilities, staff and peers. During these sessions our educators support and observe in hope of best placing your child for the following year. The more familiar, comfortable and confident our learners are the better their transition to school will be.

Throughout the transition program, parents will be invited to attend information sessions which allow adult learning about starting school life and the many operations we have. In the final transition session, you will have the opportunity to meet your child's teacher for the following year.

At times learners with additional needs may qualify for extra transition sessions. These arrangements can be made in consultation with our Leader of Learning Diversity and Inclusion.

Year 6 Learners Start to Secondary School Life

St Mary's recognises the incremental progression of starting Secondary School for our Year 6 learners. Our Year 6 learners have spent seven years in an intimate setting with 1:1 classroom teachers. In their final year of schooling our educators plan transition sessions and aim to provide learning experiences that will nurture further independence, time management and learner voice.

Our Year 6 teaching team and the Leader of Learning Diversity and Inclusion work in partnership with our feeder Secondary Schools in bridging the gap between Primary

and Secondary School. Each secondary setting will provide families with dates, purpose and transition options prior to the end of the school year. Learners with additional needs and our ATSI learners may also attend extra transitions at their chosen Secondary Schools in hope of preparing them for their future setting. Support and further information can be provided by St Mary's Leader of Learning Diversity and Inclusion.

St Mary's has developed good relationships with St. Joseph's Secondary College to encourage pathways in Catholic Education for learners from Foundation to Year 12. St Joseph's is our predominant feeder school for our learner population and we strive to collaborate and unify some practices and processes for the benefit of our learners and families. Senior learners and parents are also given many opportunities to become informed about College programs and facilities. Regular information is shared in our newsletter.

Travel to and from school

If children are either walking or cycling home, parents should expect them home by a certain time each day. If the child's mode of traveling home is to be changed, please send a note with a young child, or inform the school if alterations are made during the day.

Our pick up zone has a 20kmph limit and surrounding roads and streets to our school 40 kmph. Our pick up and drop off procedures aim to provide optimal traffic flow and steady progression. Our local law enforcement regularly monitor the area to ensure our families are adhering to road traffic laws and safety.

It is important that parents adhere to the school gate opening times of 8:30am and ensure the departure time of 3:05pm is met daily.

GENERAL SCHOOL OPERATIONS

Walking

Children walking home from school are advised not to loiter, to observe road rules, use all marked school crossings and lights and not to talk to strangers.

Bicycles / Scooters

Children need to be proficient in the area of bike riding and to know and demonstrate correct behaviour in accordance with road safety rules before being allowed to ride to school. When arriving at or leaving school, children walk their bikes through the school grounds. Whilst at school, bikes are to be stored in bike racks and sheds provided.

The Road Traffic Authority strongly recommends that children under 10 years old do not ride bicycles independently of adult supervision. Children cycling or scooting to and from school are advised to be a competent cyclist / scooter, observe road rules, exercise care, not talk to strangers and wear a helmet. Traffic Lights and Crossings

The school is situated in close proximity to the Murray Valley Highway. Children riding, scooting or walking to school may need to cross roads to access school. A set of traffic lights is situated at the intersection to allow children to cross safely. These include pedestrian lights. Children should be actively encouraged to utilise these lights for crossing the highway. The crossing is also provided for pedestrian safety and good modeling is vitally important. Staff will actively encourage the community to use the marked crossings.

Car Drop Off

A car park is provided on the western end of the school property which is for staff parking. Parents are asked to utilise parking on the school boundaries, designated parking bay and roads when coming to school and walking your child into the playground. A 'quick' drop

off/pick up zone is provided for parents who do not wish to park. This zone is situated directly out the front of the school office. To utilise this effectively, parents are asked to only drop off or pick up in this area. This means that no adults are to exit the car while in this zone. Each afternoon, a staff member will be on duty to supervise and ensure the consistent flow of traffic.

School Photos

St Mary's takes school photos at every opportunity. All events, celebrations and excursions are an opportunity to share our learning and achievements with our community. St Mary's has talented photographers who often attend our special events to capture these moments. These can be found on our website and socials. All families must provide consent for Permission to Photograph on enrolment. Our staff and photographers are discreetly made aware of any non consent learners on our register.

Formal school photos are taken annually by MSP Photography. Families are provided with ordering forms and payments can be made via Compass. Photos with school enrolled siblings can also be taken on this day. Learners are required to wear full school uniform on this day. The date for school photo day will be announced early in each school year.

SunSmart Schools: Hats, Sunscreen, Shade and Clothing

St Mary's is a SunSmart school and adheres to a SunSmart policy. All children are required to wear a school hat from January to April and then again from September to December. "No Hat / No Play" - children must then sit in a designated shade area. We encourage children to leave hats at school so they have them at all times.

As a school we are unable to provide sunscreen as some learners have skin sensitive requirements. In our summer period we do encourage families to send your child with sunscreen already applied.

School Uniform

School uniforms unite us as a school community and we aim to wear it with pride. On enrolment our learners and families commit to wearing our school uniform in its entirety.

It is an expectation at St Mary's that all children wear our school uniform each day unless it is your birthday celebration day!

Parents are responsible for making decisions with their child about whether to wear

summer or winter options, however uniforms must be worn at all times. St Mary's has seasonal uniforms and sporting uniforms. Your child's classroom teacher will advise you each term of specialist and physical education days so that you can send your child in the appropriate attire for their day.

All children are expected to wear white socks and complete black school shoes. If your child is wearing a sports shoe, it needs to be black in its entirety. Alternate running / sport shoes of varied colours can be worn on sport days.
